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## **Green jacket masters**

It's only fitting the most prestigious tournament in golf gives its winner the most iconic piece of apparel in all of sports. Each year, the winner of the Masters is gifted a green jacket, complete with brass buttons and an embroidered Augusta National patch. Coveted more so than the huge silver trophy, it is a symbol of a golfer's perseverance through one of the most challenging courses in the world, and from Bobby Jones to Gary Player to Tiger Woods, it has donned the sport's royalty for nearly 90 years. If a golfer has won the Masters Green Jacket, it means he has joined an exclusive club, as only 54 of them have been issued since the tournament began in 1934. As one might expect with such a unique award, the jacket has some strict rules that come along with it, which has led to some controversial and fun stories over time. The club eventually settled on verdant green as the color, to match the shade of the azalea bushes that lined the grounds. While members of Augusta National have been wearing jackets since the 1930s, Sam Snead was the first Masters winner to receive the coveted Green Jacket in 1949, kicking off the beloved tradition. The jacket is the trademark shade of "Pantone 342," or "Masters green," and is embroidered with the Augusta National logo on the left breast pocket. The name of the jacket's owner is stitched in the inside lining. Each green jacket takes about a month to produce and costs around \$250 to produce. Since 1934, there have been 85 tournaments played, but only 54 winners. Repeat Masters winners are not given a new jacket and don their original jacket if they win the tournament another time. Champions between 1934 and 1948 were retroactively given their green jackets. Jack Nicklaus was the first golfer to repeat as Masters champion, but in this case, Nicklaus put the jacket on himself since he also won in 1965. MORE: How do playoffs work at the Masters? Notable controversies and stories about Masters Green Jacket and its owners have made for some interesting stories over the years. South Africa's Gary Player, who became the first international winner of the Masters in 1961, famously declined to bring his jacket back when requested by Augusta National co-founder Clifford Roberts. The incident was a driving force behind players being issued a replica jacket they could keep at home. When Tiger Woods won the first of his five Masters titles in 1997, he refused to remove his green jacket after the winners' ceremony. "I fell asleep fully clothed and hugging the green jacket like a blanket," he said. In 2021, Hideki Matsuyama was spotted carrying his green jacket over his arm in the Atlanta airport, and he admitted when he returned it in 2022 that he never had it dry cleaned. The Masters Green Jacket is presented to The Masters winner in the immediate aftermath of their victory. That jacket is borrowed off an Augusta member with roughly the same build as the winner, before the champion is later measured for their own tailored version. But when did the Green Jacket tradition begin, and why? The Masters Green Jacket was first introduced in 1937. The idea was that Augusta National members would wear these jackets during the tournament to make them stand out to members of the public needing guidance or assistance. You may like It was an idea borrowed from Royal Liverpool in England when a visiting Bobby Jones attended a dinner. At this dinner there was a collection of club captains who were all wearing matching jackets to denote their position. The first Augusta National jackets soon followed, bought from the Brooks Uniform Company in New York. But they were not popular with the members, who found the material too thick and uncomfortable in warm weather, so they soon changed supplier. From 1937 through to 1948 only Augusta National members wore the jackets, but in 1949 Sam Snead became the first winner to be honored with the now famous Green Jacket. Jackets are kept on club grounds, and taking them off the premises is forbidden. The exception is for the winner, who can take it home and return it to the club the following year. Gary Player reportedly got into a heated exchange in 1962 with Cliff Roberts after he mistakenly took his jacket home to South Africa. "I didn't know you were supposed to leave it there," Player said. "Next thing you know, there was a call from Mr. Roberts." The iconic green jacket is one of the most coveted prizes in golf and has become synonymous with achievement, tradition and honor. It meant so much to 1970 Masters champion Billy Casper that he even requested to be buried in it.Of course, some players like Jordan Spieth don't know their jacket size. Following his 2015 Masters victory, Spieth recalled: "I didn't give them my size originally. I wore the one off the green that day, and I never gave it back to them to tailor or anything, ... so it's huge." The blazer is the trademarked shade "Pantone 342," or "Masters green," and is single-breasted and single-vented with logostamped custom brass buttons made in Connecticut. The left breast pocket has an embroidered patch with the Augusta National logo, and the owner's name is stitched in the inside lining. (Getty Images) The club has jackets of various sizes on standby for winners, and the ceremonial jacket originally presented to winners eventually gets swapped out for a custom one of their size. Champions also have the option to get their jacket tailored - though some like Spieth ("I never trusted anybody, never wanted anyone to go do it") have declined. Repeat winners are awarded the same original green jacket. Just ask José María Olazábal, who knew his 1994 green jacket until 1998 - 35 years after winning his first. As a heavier-set 23-year-old in 1963, Arnold Palmer presented him with a size 46 jacket. "It hung on me like an old blanket," Nicklaus used a loaner jacket for his next three wins. Wanting to keep it going, he eventually ordered a replica green jacket - of completely wrong cut and color - that was presented to him in 1975. Somehow, nobody noticed. Finally, the jig was up in 1997, when Nicklaus approached Chairman Jack Stephens, who offered up a new, official green jacket. Entering Sunday at Augusta National, surely every player in contention dresses himself with the possibility of a green jacket in the back of his mind? But in the case of Bernhard Langer at the 1985 Masters, perhaps not. He became the first Masters champion to pair a bright red shirt and pants with the green jacket, and he lit up Augusta National like a Christmas tree. "I felt comfortable in red," said Langer. "It's an aggressive color." Langer is not the only champion to have graced the fairways with bold fashion choices. In his first of three Masters victories, Sir Nick Faldo wore a white sweater with green jacket garb with a Union Jack-patterned cap. During the final round of the 1995 Masters, Ben Crenshaw wore a whimsical shirt featuring photos of Bobby Jones printed all over. (Getty Images)Only the defending Masters champion may take his green jacket off the grounds, and Faldo took full advantage of that perk. As the legend of the green jacket grew, so did the buzz around the champion after each tournament, and Faldo began to wear it during press appearances. Other players followed suit, as champions like Trevor Immelman and Zach Johnson wore the jacket as they went through the post-Masters New York "car wash," appearing on talk shows, touring the Empire State Building and ringing the opening bell at the New York stock exchange. (Getty Images)Immelman also paid a visit to see his favorite basketball team, the Boston Celtics, play in Madison Square Garden, cementing the tradition of wearing the green jacket to other sporting events. Both 2003 champion Mike Weir and 2022 champion Scottie Scheffler opened sports games in their green jackets, as Weir dropped the puck at the Air Canada Centre and Scheffler threw the first at a Texas football game, and 2016 champion Danny Willett attended Wimbledon wearing his green jacket. When asked to return his jacket in 2002 by then-Chairman Hootie Johnson, two-time Masters champion Seve Ballesteros (1980, 1983) declined. South Africa's Gary Player, who became the first international winner of the Masters in 1961, was requested to bring his jacket back by Clifford Roberts. He famously replied, "Fine, Mr. Roberts, if you want it, come and fetch it!" Player ultimately agreed to not wear the jacket in public, and players were eventually issued a replica jacket they could keep at home. Over the years, other wacky scenarios have emerged. When a 21-year-old Tiger Woods won his first of five Masters Champions in 1997, he refused to remove it. "I fell asleep fully clothed and hugging the green jacket like a blanket," he recalled afterward. When 2007 champion Zach Johnson arrived in Times Square with the jacket covered by a white trash bag, his wife Kim explained: "We don't have a garment bag. We didn't plan on winning the Masters." While back home in Australia, 2013 champion Adam Scott endured a scare: "One of the buttons was ripped off by a friend of mine because he was just so excited," he shared. Luckily, Scott was able to patch it up at home with no long-term issues. AUGUSTA, Ga. — This isn't any ordinary jacket, so there are rules when it comes to the Masters green jacket. And the Masters winner may slip one on come Sunday evening, but that doesn't mean it will sit in the champion's closet until the end of time. Guidelines are strict regarding the sport's most iconic article of clothing. First off, jackets are reserved for club members and Masters winners. Taking jackets off the grounds is a big no-no, unless you are the most recent Masters champ. The current champ gets to keep the jacket in their possession for a year before returning it during the next year's Masters (the one they get at the winner's ceremony is temporary; they are fitted and receive a new one soon after). When a new champion is crowned, the previous winner (like all other winners before them) has to keep his jacket at the club. They only get to wear it when they come back to the club or if they happen to be out representing the Masters or Augusta National at an event with ties to the club.
