A sua vida está perfeita, mas ela tem um sonho (lão real e vívido, ao qual acorda em um apartamento totalmente diferente, com outro anel de noivado em seu dedo e um homem muito gato em sua cama, que nunca tinha visto antes. A televisão mostra que é a mesma data, 15 de dezembro, mas cinco anos no futuro. Será que Dannie está maluca? Quase 4 anos e meio se passam, Dannie pensa ainda naquele sonho e no homem que estava em sua cama. Ela imagina que seria só um sonho, e não uma premonição que pode acontecer. É isso que ela quer acreditar, até que Dannie encontra o homem que sonhou naquela noite inusitada. Quando li a sinopse do livro, achei que iríamos ter um triângulo amoroso. Mas encontrei algo totalmente diferente do que pensei, e infelizmente me decepcionei um pouco com o desenvolvimento dos personagens. A história foi um romance muito dramático, tocante e forte, ao qual mostra os vários tipos de amor, como o de amizade, o romântico entre um casal e o familiar. Sobre a personagem principal Dannie, me irritei bastante com seu jeito manipulador, controlador e metucioso em calcular quanto tempo chegaria até o trabalho ou contar quantos passos ela daria para sair da cama, para ir no banheiro e tomar banho. The first few pages of In Five Years were actually enthralling. I was instantly hooked by Rebecca Serle's worked and mellow writing.I remember thinking when I was 15% in that I could already tell that this had the potential to be a five-star book. Unfortunately, not long after, everything came crashing down.Dannie is the type-A-personality-person that has her life together. She is methodical and mechanic. She has clear plans for life. She wants to work on one of New York's most successful law firms and she goes to the interview with a suit she picked out for the occasion three years prior. She lives with her longtime boyfriend and knows exactly when he's going to propose. They have the same ambitions and dreams. Everything is clockwork-perfect, until... something weird happens.Dannie falls asleep and wakes up five years in the future. The year is 2025 and she is now living in a completely different apartment in Brooklyn, she's using a different engagement ring and living with another man who is not her fiancée. Dannie spends 1 hour in this future-time/alternate reality and then goes back to her scheduled life in 2020. Of course, she cannot understand what happened but is at the same time haunted by this vision. She even goes to a therapist and tries to make sense of what this could represent in her life.Then we jump forward 4 years, and the events from the vision are getting very close to the present timeline Dannie is on, and here is where my rant will start, so beware of spoilers. I loved the premise of this book, until around 30/40% I was completely captivated by Dannie's tale and I saw this vision being a catalyst for her to understand so many things about herself. So, my 2.5 stars rating are exclusively for this first part of the book.Because the way the story unravels from then on makes absolutely no sense. We learn that the stranger living in Dannie's future apartment is actually her best friend's boyfriend and future fiancée. Let me tell you about Bella. The book tells us they are the best of friends, they grew up together and mean everything to one another. But, this is what we are told because the actions and descriptions actually lead you to believe there's a ton of competition and resentment between them. To every sweet moment between them, there is an opposite and toxic little scene.To resolve the conflict of the mysterious man divided by the two friends the book introduces a plot that I really dislike out of left-field: terminal cancer. You see, what was supposed to be a contemplative romantic fiction became an overdramatic mess. Yeah, let's get rid of the friend to clear the path for Dannie, right? Yikes.What about Dannie's current and lovely fiancée that does everything for her? Apparently, they have no chemistry and he was only a prop to bring more angst into the story, so of course, Dannie can just cut him from her life after almost six years together. After Bella dies, literally the same day as the funeral, that's when Dannie has the one night stand with her ex-fiancée (yeah, that happened and it came from absolutely nowhere), but it was out of grief?! Just take a moment to let it sink in that the blurb for this book actually describes: "an unforgettable love story that reminds us of the power of loyalty, friendship" But in the end, after all of this absurdness, it's implied that Dannie ends up with Bella's oncologist?! WHAT A MESS.Also, the amazing future scene from the beginning doesn't fit in this new context anymore. The dialogue (jumping forward five years) gets disconnected. Basically, that's not the way humans communicate with each other. It's weird, and it doesn't work!This was such a letdown because I was so intrigued about the true meaning of that conversation, and I was robbed of the emotional payoff it was supposed to give.Honestly, I didn't know it was possible to mess up a beautiful premise so much...So, anyway... In a nutshell, the first half of this book is intriguing. The second part is chaotic, frustrating, and 100% illogical. There's something fascinating about the concept of knowing one's own future. Do you let it dictate your actions? Is there any way you can avoid your destiny if you don't like it? Those are tough questions, and the scenario facing Dannie is especially hard because this peek into her future self plants the seeds of doubt about the direction of her life and the person she's with.And yet, this book is also so much more than that. It sets forth Dannie's personal journey of growth and discovery. It explores friendships and relationships and dealing with loss. The characters in here are fascinating, as are the choices they are forced to make. It all combines into the best possible mix, leaving me riveted throughout.However, the ending threw me a bit. Without giving anything away, I'll say that the story led the reader in a specific direction, a seemingly profound one. It would've made the whole story come together at an insightful destination. But it didn't go that way. It went somewhere else, and that direction took a bit away from the story that the author was trying to craft.Still, I ended up loving most of it. I found the characters interesting, their choices difficult and nuanced, and the plot line compelling. Even though the ending wasn't as stellar as I hoped, I still very much enjoyed the journey. Of course I have to be the person who didn't love this! In Five Years is the story of a woman who has it all: the perfect fiancé, the perfect apartment, and the perfect job. But having it all doesn't mean that she's truly happy, and a tragedy is about to test the boundaries of all that she believed to be perfect. The night Dannie, a corporate lawyer, gets engaged she has a wild dream that takes place 5 years in the future. This dream is about to alter her life in ways she could have never predicted. On a positive note, Dannie's dream and the way that is framed is the one element I really liked about this book.My biggest issues with this book concern the narrative and Dannie's character. Dannie's character never felt real to me. I actually forgot her name until another character would speak it. Constantly discussing her food choices and commenting on the weather seemed like tropes the author used to make Dannie's character feel real, but these elements didn't add any depth. Serle also uses food to show how Dannie transforms, i.e. she is going to change by ordering something different from her norm. It also didn't feel natural the way she was talking about NYC; it was almost like reading a tourist's perspective of the city.Onto the narrative: There was way too much of Dannie discussing her issues with her fiancé (I already forgot his name and finished this yesterday) and with Bella (her best friend) without the reader getting to see what was truly going on in their relationship. All of the characters felt one-dimensional and clichéd. They didn't elicit any emotion, rather they checked off the boxes to complete Dannie's story.I know a lot of people loved this book and I apologize if I said anything that diminishes one's reading experience. My personal experience was not a good one. For some reason, this book angered me to no end. I don't know what exactly triggered my anger, but it might have been because I found this book predictable, one-dimensional, and frustrating to read.
